

"Hidden Japan" is an exhibition of 85 photographic works that all have "nature" as their topic. The photographs were taken by Mr. Kijuro YAHAGI, a photographer and graphic designer from Yamagata province in Northern Japan. On 20,000 kilometers of travels throughout Japan, he photographed a wide variety of Japanese sceneries, ranging from traditional temples to the streets of modern metropolises. The exhibition is organized by the Japan Foundation, travels from country to country and will be on display at Oslo City Museum until 21 March 2010.





At the opening, on the Japanese National Foundation Day 11 February, Ambassador of Japan Hisao YAMAGUCHI and Director Vibeke Mohr of Oslo City Museum held speeches. Dr. Liv Lande, an Ethnomusicologist educated in Japan, Norway and the United States, played the pieces Sakura (Cherry Blossom) and Midare (Disarray) on the Japanese traditional instrument koto. The koto is a long zither with 13 strings that are strung longitudinally over the body of the instrument, held up by 13 movable bridges.

LECTURES ON ECONOMIC INNOVATION IN JAPAN

HÅNDVERKEREN / UNIVERSITY OF OSLO / NORWEGIAN SCHOOL OF MANAGEMENT

Professor Seiichiro Yonekura of Hitotsubashi University in Japan visited Oslo in the middle of February to meet Norwegian government representatives, journalists and businesspeople and hold three lectures on Japanese economic innovation. The first lecture, which was held in the evening of 15 February in the facilities of the Norwegian Polytechnic Society, gathered people of various professional backgrounds, many of whom came to the meeting after a day's work. In a break after the lecture, they were served sushi that had been prepared by the chef of Ambassador Hisao YAMAGUCHI, before they continued with a stimulating Q&A session.

On 16 February, Professor Yonekura held one lecture for an auditorium full of young students at the University of Oslo, and one lecture for a mid-career Master's degree class at the Norwegian School of Management. After explaining how businesses and the government in Japan had contributed to rapid postwar economic growth, he moved on to talk about innovations that could solve future challenges. He suggested that Japan could sell not only cars and motorcycles, but also systems of transportation and traffic regulation to developing countries. He also said that robot suits can make it possible for weak elderly persons to lift heavy weights, and thereby help us to overcome some of the difficulties of the aging society.
